North Eastern Driving Trials has adopted the British Equestrian "Safeguarding Equestrian Sport" policy, which is available for download (see below).

North Eastern Driving Trials is committed to providing a safe and enjoyable environment for children, young people and adults at risk.

Whether involved in Competitions or any other Events organised by North Eastern Driving Trials, including activities such as training and coaching events, courses, assessments and professional development days, all these participants have a right to be safe and protected from harm.

It is important that all committee members of North Eastern Driving Trials read, understand and implement the key principles of safeguarding as set out in the BEF policy and should apply that policy itself as far as they can.

As part of this, the committee of North Eastern Driving Trials has appointed an officer within the club to be the safeguarding lead and has notified British Carriagedriving who that is. This is because:

Developments in safeguarding good practice regularly take place and these need to be implemented at club level by awareness and training, including through regular training of all those in the club to varying degrees, depending on the work they do for the club. British Carriagedriving will help keep all nominated safeguarding leads up to date.

British Carriagedriving can give assistance to the nominated safeguarding lead in the event that there is concern about specific individuals or circumstances.
